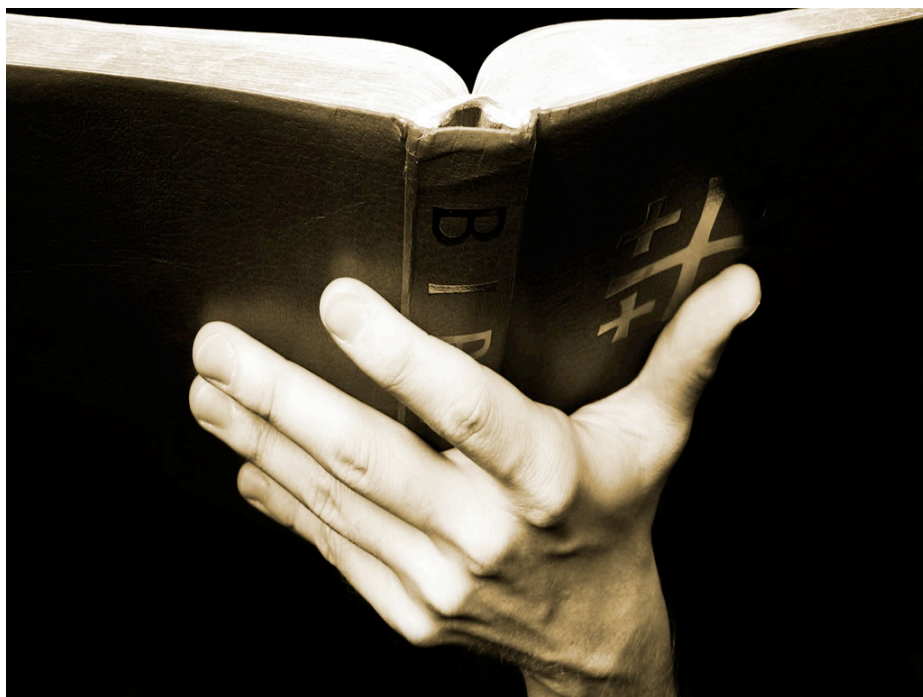

Persistence is a common thread linking the lectionary passages for today. In 2 Timothy, Paul urges followers of Christ to be persistent in proclaiming the good news, even in unfavorable times and places. The gospel lesson from Luke details the story of the persistent widow who sought justice again and again until the judge relented and granted her request. God's persistence and the widow's persistence reveal the tenacity of love and faith.
