Maundy Thursday marks the beginning of the great Easter celebration. The word "maundy" is said to be derived from the Latin word *mandatum*, the first word of the Latin phrase, "Mandatum novum do vobis ut diligatis invicem sicut dilexi vos" ("A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you"). Jesus uses this statement in John's gospel to explain the significance of washing the disciples' feet. Maundy Thursday is also the night that Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper with the words, "Do this in remembrance of me." As a way to remember that night, all the worship articles and adornments are removed from the altar. This removal symbolizes both the suspension of Holy Communion, which is not celebrated on Good Friday, and the abandonment and humiliation of Jesus Christ.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

SHARING OF THE BREAD AND WINE

All those who have become members of Christ's body through baptism and seek to be united with God and at peace with their neighbor are invited to receive communion. Wine is used for communion. The tradition as understood at Duke Chapel is that the Holy Spirit makes Christ fully present in both the bread and the wine. If you receive only the bread, be assured that you

are nonetheless in full communion with Christ and the Church. If you have a gluten allergy, there is a station near the Memorial Chapel with gluten-free wafers and wine on request. If you do not plan to take communion, you may come forward to receive a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

If you would like to receive individual anointing with oil and prayers for healing, ministers will be in the Memorial Chapel during communion.

TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

We are pleased to welcome the Rev. Dr. Laceye Warner as our Peter J. Gomes distinguished guest preacher. She is an ordained elder in the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and currently serves as the Executive Vice Dean and Associate Professor of the Practice of Evangelism and Methodist Studies at Duke Divinity School. Before coming to Duke Dr. Warner served urban congregations in the Methodist Church of Britain and taught at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. Dr. Warner's research interests in the historical theology of evangelism seek to inform and locate contemporary church practices within the larger Christian narrative. These interests are reflected in two books published in 2007: Saving Women: Retrieving Evangelistic Theology and Practice (Baylor University Press) and The Study of Evangelism, co-edited with Dr. Paul Chilcote (Eerdmans Publishing Company). She was a contributing editor to the Wesley Study Bible and co-authored a book with Bishop Kenneth Carder titled Grace to Lead: Practicing Leadership in the Wesleyan Tradition, which was published in fall 2010.
