Tenth Sunday after Pentecost July 28, 2013 Eleven o'clock in the morning

In the scripture lesson for today, the images from Hosea are stark, even crude, using prostitution as a metaphor. Hosea shows how God's heart has broken and hardened because of Israel's infidelity and her abandonment of his loving covenant. In Colossians, Paul urges spiritual maturity—a faith that is deeply rooted in the fullness and authority of Christ and is not prone to faithlessness. In Luke, Jesus encourages his disciples to approach God with intimacy, using the title of Father. The God of Israel waits with longing and expectation, desiring to give abundantly to those who knock at the door.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel, located to the left of the chancel.

Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a Service of Healing will be held in the Memorial Chapel. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

#### ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we are pleased to welcome the Rev. Dr. Kenyatta Gilbert as our Peter Gomes Guest Preacher. Dr. Gilbert is Associate Professor of Homiletics at the Howard University School of Divinity. He earned his B.A. from Baylor University and both his M.Div. and Ph.D. from Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Gilbert specializes in the history, theory, and practice of African American preaching. He is author of *The* Journey and Promise of African American Preaching (Fortress). His second book, which is in progress, is tentatively titled Cry Out! Preaching Justice, Practicing Hope. Dr. Gilbert is a summer 2013 Andrew Mellon Fellow at the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center at Howard University. He is an ordained Baptist minister and founder of The Preaching Project (www.thepreachingproject.org). Prior to joining Howard's Divinity School faculty in 2006, he served congregations in Texas, New York, New Jersey, and Kenya. Dr. Gilbert is married to Dr. Allison Blow Gilbert, a pediatrician. The Gilberts have three daughters: Olivia Copeland, Ella Jane, and Ava Sage.
