The scripture lessons this morning carry an undertone of warning. In Jeremiah, God speaks to Jeremiah using an illustration common to daily life in ancient Israel, making a clay pot. The potter can mold and shape the clay. If the potter is not satisfied, he can rework the clay into a different vessel. If Israel submits itself to the potter, it can participate in God's purposes. The gospel lesson in Luke speaks to the cost of discipleship. Allegiance to Jesus must come before all other loyalties. This commitment calls God's people to radical discipleship—to lay aside all the cares and distractions, and open their eyes instead to the vision of God.
