The last Sunday in October, Reformation Sunday, commemorates the sixteenth-century reformers who initiated the Protestant Reformation. Reformation Sunday reminds us that the work of God is never finished and that the Church should maintain a posture of humility so as to be ever open to the reforming work of God.
