In the third week of Advent, God's promises of new life echo through the scriptures. In Isaiah, a new age is dawning—an age characterized by fertility of the land, the return of the exiles, and healing and safety for those who obey God. In the gospel of Luke, Mary speaks words of praise (often referred to as the *Magnificat*) in response to her newly revealed pregnancy, marveling at the mysterious works of God.
