The 5:15 p.m. service will include the Duke Vespers Ensemble. Ash Wednesday marks the first day of the season of Lent. Lent encompasses the 40 days prior to Easter Sunday (not including the 6 Sundays, which are considered feast days and not counted as days of penance) and is traditionally a season of repentance and fasting.
