The scripture lessons tell of the power of the Spirit to give life and empower for the work of the Lord. Transported by the Spirit of the Lord, Ezekiel finds himself placed in the middle of a valley of dry bones. The Lord tells Ezekiel to prophesy to the bones saying that even what is dead will be made to live. The people of God will know the Lord when they have been raised to life and been filled with the Spirit. The Gospel lesson tells of one of Jesus' appearances after he has been raised from his grave by the power of the Spirit. John writes that Jesus's disciples were gathered in a locked room when Jesus comes and stands among them. Jesus speaks peace upon his disciples and breathes on them, sharing with them the Spirit that empowers them to do God's work. Jesus offers the same Spirit to disciples today that we might have life and be empowered to serve the Lord.
