The scripture lessons today focus on repentance and the calling to live righteously. In the lesson from Ezekiel, God declares that children and parents will be responsible for their own righteousness or sinfulness. Through Ezekiel, the Lord proclaims that "the righteousness of the righteous shall be his own and the wickedness of the wicked shall be his own." Yet the message does not stop there. The Lord reminds the people of the way of forgiveness and life, telling them to turn away from their transgressions to receive a new heart and a new spirit. In the lesson from Luke, Jesus tells the parable of the fig tree which emphasizes both his demand that those who would follow him bear the fruit of the kingdom and his patience with those who have failed to produce that fruit.
