The scripture texts today speak to the relationship between God and the use of resources. Amos prophetically calls to account any who trample the needy and bring ruin to the land. He reminds those who would take advantage of the poor that God sees and remembers their actions. The Gospel of Luke speaks to the use of money by those who follow Jesus. In telling the story of the shrewd manager, Jesus tells the disciples they can only serve one master, either God or money. For disciples then and now, the choice is always to put money in service of God rather than God in service of money.

TODAY'S OFFERING | All of today's cash offerings and checks written to Duke University Chapel will be used to support Duke Chapel's sponsorship of a Habitat for Humanity home with the Duke Student Chapter of Habitat for Humanity. Duke Habitat is an active student organization on campus that raises awareness and funds for Durham Habitat for Humanity. Families selected by Habitat work closely with volunteers, investing 240–300 hours of their own labor, or "sweat equity," in building their homes. Because partner families and Duke students do nearly 80% of the work on Habitat homes, a Duke Chapter house fosters close connections between the students of Duke University and the people of Durham.
