Today's scripture lessons turn our attention to the end times and the coming of the Lord, even before the season of Advent has officially begun. In the lesson from 2 Thessalonians, the apostle Paul exhorts the church at Thessalonica not to grow weary in doing what is right and to live in a way that is consistent with the Gospel. Jesus prophesies portents in the heavens and growing persecution of the church, urging his disciples to endure and trust in him. Yet, he offers assurance that, despite difficulty, "not a hair of your head will perish."
