


SERVICE OF WORSHIP

CHRISTMAS EVE OFFERING | This year's offerings will go to support families in need both at home and abroad. As part of the Chapel's ongoing commitment to partnership with the people of Haiti, half of this year's Christmas Eve offerings will go to Family Health Ministries (FHM). FHM is a nonprofit agency, founded by Dr. David and Mrs. Kathy Walmer, which provides medical care and support to the people of Haiti. Since 2004, the Chapel's work with FHM has included building the Blanchard Health Clinic and the Nancy Ferree-Clark Guesthouse, named in honor of the former Congregation pastor. The other half of the offering will go to World Relief Durham to work with immigrants, churches, and the community to help vulnerable immigrants thrive in the Triangle. World Relief resettles refugees, provides immigration legal services, and partners with schools to fill gaps for vulnerable immigrant youth. TODAY'S CHOIR | The Durham Children's Choir is a community organization which exists to provide exceptional choral education to children regardless of race, creed, or socio-economic station. Founded in 2004 by Scott Hill, and under the leadership of Artistic Director Dena Byers, the Durham Children's Choir performs music of various cultures and genres and shares that music with the community at public and private events. They especially enjoy collaborating with area music educators, composers, and arts organizations. The choir has recently sung at Duke Chapel's Blessing of the Animals service and with the Duke Chapel Bach Ensemble; they participated in Mayor Bell's retirement celebrations and have performed in Carnegie Hall. These ventures enable the Durham Children's Choir to have a greater presence in the community and provide the children with invaluable learning opportunities.
