

In the second Sunday of Lent, the scripture lessons emphasize faith rooted in the grace of God. In Romans, Paul points to Abraham as the father of faith, emphasizing that Abraham was justified by faith and not by works. In this way, God's promised inheritance to Abraham and his descendants is dependent on grace. In John's gospel, Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born again. In doing so, Jesus intimates that Nicodemus, though a leader among the Pharisees, does not yet understand true obedience which grows from loving trust in the living God.

TODAY'S GUEST CHOIR | The Millbrook High School Madrigals from Raleigh, North Carolina, is a mixed auditioned ensemble that typically ranges from twenty-five to thirty-five members. Represented in this group are sophomores through seniors, who dedicate themselves—year round—to daily rehearsals and average twenty to thirty performances a year. These performances include Duke Chapel, the North Carolina Governor's Mansion, the State Capitol Building, and many concerts at Millbrook High School. The Madrigals receive consistent Superior ratings at major festivals in both performance and musical literacy.

SPRING ORATORIO APRIL 4 | The Chapel Choir's spring concert, "Multivalence: The Mass and Its Music," will be held on Saturday, April 4, at 7:30 p.m. The concert explores the diverse music of the Mass across ten centuries and five continents. The program begins with a pastiche Mass, including musical settings by Louis Vierne, Hildegard of Bingen, William Byrd, Johann Walter, Eleanor Daley, and more. The second half of the program features Ludwig van Beethoven's majestic Mass in C Major, Op. 86, in observance of the 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth. Commentary during the concert will be provided by the Rev. Dr. Paul Westermeyer, a prolific author and scholar of sacred music and professor emeritus at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota.
