


Thanksgiving and Communion

*The Great Thanksgiving

Minister:	The Lord be with you.
People:	And also with you.
Minister:	Lift up your hearts.
People:	We lift them up to the Lord.
Minister:	Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People:	It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The leader gives thanks, remembering God's acts of salvation, and concludes:

...We praise you, joining our voices with the celestial choirs and with all the faithful of every time and place, who forever sing to the glory of your name:



The leader continues, invoking the presence of the Holy Spirit, and recalling the institution of the Lord's Supper. The leader concludes:

... Great is the mystery of faith.

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

The leader praises the Trinity, concluding:

...through whom and with whom and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory are yours, now and forever.

Amen.
