WELCOME TO EVENSONG

Welcome to Evensong at Duke University Chapel. Evensong is a liturgy offered to God by people in every part of the world throughout the day and night. When we participate in Evensong at Duke, we are joining a conversation already in progress—a conversation between God and God's people that began long before we were born and will continue long after our death. Because of this, do not be surprised if there are some things you do not understand right away. Much of the English in the service is in the style spoken and written more than four hundred years ago. It may sound old-fashioned but its relevance and meaning are not out of date.

NOTE ON THE SERVICE

Our service today celebrates the Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord, also called Ascension Day. This festival celebrates the ecumenical belief that, having risen from the dead and spending forty days among his disciples, Jesus Christ then ascended into heaven, an account found both in Luke 24:44–53 and Acts 1:1–11. Through the Incarnation, God took on human flesh and descended to us. In "Ascending to the Father's throne," as tonight's opening hymn sings, "thou claim'st the kingdom as thine own." Ascension Day not only glorifies Christ's place as King of Creation, but also promises us a place by his side.

Today's service is also a collaboration between Duke Chapel and the Royal School of Church Music in America, a partnership which entered a new phase in 2020, when RSCM America's offices moved to Duke Chapel, but whose close ties began many years before. Duke Chapel is grateful for the presence, participation, and leadership of Hugh Morris, director of the Royal School of Church Music, the parent organization of RSCM America, for that of Joseph Causby, president of RSCM America, and for that of musician, conductor, and composer Simon Lole. We also welcome choristers from the Chapel of the Cross and United Church of Chapel Hill, both located in Chapel Hill, as well as choristers from St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Winston-Salem, North Carolina.





Performances by ChorWorks Singers | In association with Duke Chapel Music, the Chorworks Young Artists Program is taking place June 13–19 at Duke. This annual program is designed for musicians at the early stages of their professional careers, and provides training and performance opportunities with a focus on early music. This year's program is an in-depth exploration of the music of the Italian baroque composer Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643). Singers in the program will give two public performances directed by Chapel Associate Conductor Philip Cave, both of which are free and open to the public:

THE ROYAL SCHOOL OF CHURCH MUSIC

The Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) fosters the flourishing of church music. Since its founding in 1927, the RSCM has grown from a training college for church musicians (called the College of St. Nicolas) to an ecumenical association of affiliated churches, with over 11,000 affiliates in the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Nigeria, and throughout Europe. Through this network of affiliated churches, schools, and other institutions, together with thousands more individual members, supporters, and volunteers, the RSCM works collaboratively to achieve the vision of bringing people closer to God through music.

HUGH MORRIS, DIRECTOR, RSCM

Hugh Morris has been the director of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) since August 2018. An experienced and accomplished choir trainer, organist and trained teacher, with a passion for, and interest in, a wide range of music both sacred and secular, he has worked in a number of cathedrals, churches, and schools across the United Kingdom.

Following organ scholarships at Cambridge University and Salisbury Cathedral, Morris spent eight years at Hexham Abbey in northern England as assistant organist, combining this post with teaching at the King's School, Tynemouth, and Newcastle University, before moving to become director of music at Christchurch Priory in Dorset in 2009. At Christchurch, he founded a new Priory Music and Arts Festival, acting as artistic director for its inauguration in 2014; during this time, he also taught music at Bournemouth School for Girls. He moved to Derby as director of music at the cathedral in January 2015, overseeing the extensive music program, and immersing himself in the life of the cathedral, city and further afield, until moving to the RSCM in 2018.

As an organist, Morris has given many solo recitals at venues across Europe, competed in the finals of two international organ competitions, and accompanied a large number of choirs, something he continues to enjoy. He is an ex-pupil of Abingdon School, a graduate of Magdalene College, Cambridge, and holds the Fellowship and Choral Direction diplomas of the Royal College of Organists. Hugh and his family live in rural Derbyshire, in the very middle of the UK, where the pleasures of walking in the Peak District and trying to keep the garden and allotment under control keep him happily occupied.

THE ROYAL SCHOOL OF CHURCH MUSIC IN AMERICA

RSCM America is the branch of the Royal School of Church Music in the United States. Our goal is to uplift the spiritual life of our communities through excellence in liturgical music. RSCM America provides an acclaimed structured choral training guide—Voice for Life—that supports choral singers of all ages as they develop vocal skills, musical understanding, and knowledge of the repertoire. Our affiliates are among the most talented and experienced choral leaders in the country, and many serve as mentors for younger directors who are just beginning their careers.

RSCM America also offers training courses each summer across the country, providing a place for sacred music, music education, and spiritual growth for youth and adults alike. The 25th anniversary of the Carolina Course takes place at Duke University the week of July 11–17, culminating in leading the music on Sunday morning for Duke Chapel's service and for a Choral Evensong on Sunday afternoon.

JOSEPH CAUSBY, PRESIDENT, RSCM AMERICA

Dr. Joseph Causby is the director of music and organist of the Chapel of the Cross in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, and president of the Royal School of Church Music in America. Prior to his appointment in Chapel Hill, Dr. Causby spent fourteen years in Texas, most recently at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, San Antonio, where he built one of the most active music programs in the country. Under his direction, the St. Mark's choir took part in three international English Cathedral residencies; performed major works with orchestra; and recorded and broadcasted live on NPR and PBS. A passionate collaborator, Dr. Causby has formed relationships with universities and international organizations including Snape Malting's Friday Afternoons project, the Royal Academy of Music, and Cambridge University.

Locally, he has worked with Duke University Chapel's organ scholar initiative, private and public school music education programs, and the University of North Carolina's music department and faculty. In addition to serving on the RSCM board since 2017, he is past co-chair of the 2018 national conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians, former board member of the Youth Orchestra of San Antonio, and former artistic director of the Alamo Baroque Festival.
