In today's Old Testament lesson we are reminded of Abraham's obedience to God's will. When God told Abraham to leave his homeland and his people for the promise of blessing, Abraham obeyed. Because of his faithfulness, God covenanted to bless all families of the earth through Abraham. In Psalm 121, we hear of the Lord's faithfulness as both creator and protector of all people. In the lesson from John's Gospel, Jesus presents a new covenant—one we enter through water and the Spirit—and explains to Nicodemus the fullness of God's plan, a plan to give us spiritual re-birth through a new covenant, bringing us assurance of salvation and eternal life. In the season of Lent, we remember the faithfulness of both Abraham and Nicodemus and journey anew towards the cross and the making of this covenant.



Window Restoration in Memorial Chapel | Work to restore the vibrancy of the Chapel's stained-glass windows has resumed this week in Memorial Chapel. The side chapel (on the left when facing the altar) and the crypt are closed while work is in progress through March 22 and again from April 10 through May 5. The main sanctuary and all other parts of the Chapel will remain open with regular programming throughout this time.

Bach Cantata Concert | The next concert in the Chapel's Bach Cantata Series is today at 5:00 p.m. and will feature three of J.S. Bach's violin concertos, including the "Double Concerto" for two violins and orchestra. The Chapel's Conductor-in-Residence, Dr. Philip Cave, will direct the performance by the musicians of Mallarmé Music; it is also the closing event of the 2023 North Carolina HIP Music Festival. Before the concert, at 4:00 p.m. in the Divinity School's Goodson Chapel, Chad Fothergill, the Chapel's interim organist, will give a talk entitled "Bach Concertos: It's a Southern Thing." Admission is free.

Scholars to Discuss Dean Powery's New Book | In an online conversation this Tuesday, March 7, at 7:30 p.m., Duke Chapel Dean Luke A. Powery will discuss his latest book, *Becoming Human: The Holy Spirit and the Rhetoric of Race*, with two leading scholars in fields that are important to the book. Dean Powery will be joined by the Rev. Dr. Willie James Jennings, associate professor of systematic theology and Africana studies at Yale Divinity School, and Dr. Charmaine Royal, the Robert O. Keohane Professor of African and African American Studies, Biology, Global Health, and Family Medicine and Community Health at Duke University. *Becoming Human* recently won the 2023 Book of the Year award from the Academy of Parish Clergy.
