


SERVICE OF WORSHIP Third Sunday in Lent Sunday, March 12, 2023, 11:00 a.m.

The Israelites have fled the oppression of enslavement in Egypt only to find themselves wandering—thirsty—in the desert and wondering if God is still with them, as we hear in today's Old Testament lesson. In the Gospel reading, we see Jesus also tired and thirsty from his travels through dry, hot lands. He sits to rest and then violates three cultural taboos: he speaks to someone who is a Samaritan, a woman, and a known sinner. Yet in breaking so many taboos with a simple request for water, he also offers so much healing. This woman hears the good news of God's mercy and finds such joy that she rushes to share it with others. So here, in the midst of the dryness of Lent, we are reminded that in Christ we find a radical and never-ending source of renewal and life.


I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

Today's Musicians | The Chancel Choir is one of eight musical ensembles at Salisbury Presbyterian Church, Midlothian, Virginia and is under the direction of Dr. Mark Patterson and accompanied by Cathy Armistead. Made up entirely of volunteer singers, Chancel Choir sings most Sundays for the 11:00 worship service at Salisbury Presbyterian and provides music for special events throughout the church year. In addition to its primary role supporting congregational worship, Chancel Choir has also enjoyed singing at the Washington National Cathedral; Carnegie Hall; St. Giles' Cathedral in Edinburgh, Scotland; and the historic Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Today's Music | Our response hymn today is an original text and tune by Sarah Lapp, Divinity '24. The text is based upon Psalm 1 and today's reading from John 4. It was written as the final project for a hymnody course at Duke Divinity School that was taught by Dr. Zebulon Highben. Lapp is a second–year MDiv student and a candidate for the certificate in Theology and the Arts. Originally from State College, Pennsylvania, she grew up playing the violin and completed a degree in music education at Grove City College. Since then, her love of music has deepened her love for the church's acts of worship, and she hopes to continue to write music for the church and to study the ways music forms congregations in worship.

Organ Recital March 26 | In his recital this year on Sunday, March 26, at 5:00 p.m., University Organist Dr. Robert Parkins will feature the Brombaugh and Flentrop organs in works by early Portuguese composers, Bach, Bovet, Brahms, Frescobaldi, Heiller, and Mozart. A professor of the practice of music at Duke, Dr. Parkins's solo recordings have appeared on the Calcante, Gothic, Loft, Musical Heritage Society, and Naxos labels. Admission is free.

Lecture on 'Marc Chagall and the Bible' March 29 | Author Vivian R. Jacobson will give a lecture on the exhibition 'Marc Chagall and the Bible', which is currently on display on the Chapel. The talk will be on Wednesday, March 29, at 12:30 p.m. in 0014 Westbrook in the Divinity School. An associate of Chagall, Jacobson work closely with him on major international projects during the last eleven years of his life. Based on her experiences with Chagall, she wrote *Sharing Chagall: A Memoir*. In 2001, Jacobson was appointed a speaker on Chagall for the North Carolina Humanities Council Forum in conjunction with the National Endowment of the Arts.

Talk on "Decoding Happiness" March 31 | Pravrajika Divyanandaprana, a member of a Hindu monastic community, will give a lecture on "Decoding Happiness" on Friday, March 31, at 7:00 p.m. in the Divinity School's Goodson Chapel. The author of the books Science of Happiness and Self Discovery, Divyanandaprana speaks internationally on the intersection of subjective and objective sciences. A recording of her lecture on the "Science of Focus" has been viewed on YouTube more than a million times. Admission is free; an RSVP is requested via the Duke Chapel website.


