Welcome to Choral Evensong at Duke Chapel. You are welcome here, whether you are a student, a member of the community, or a visitor. Most of today's service is sung by the choir and clergy. The congregation is invited to participate through prayer and meditation and by singing the hymns. We thank you for joining us and hope that this offering of worship will be a blessing to you.

Choral Evensong combines music, scripture, and prayer and is celebrated in cathedrals, churches, and chapels around the world, drawing people from diverse backgrounds and faith traditions. Its roots stretch back to early Temple worship, and its timeless beauty and contemplative nature make it a cherished tradition for regular worshipers, and for those seeking solace or reflection in their busy lives. Evensong has inspired composers to write some of their most beautiful music.

At Duke Chapel, Evensong is sung on the second and fourth Sundays of the month during the academic year. The service lasts approximately forty-five minutes. Music of the great English composer of sacred music, Herbert Howells, will feature prominently on the second Sundays this year. On the fourth Sundays of the month, the service will feature music with a particular focus on a place or tradition.

You are warmly invited to sit where you will, including the chancel, and to join us in prayer and in singing the hymns as you wish. We hope that these services will provide a restorative and uplifting experience. The services are live-streamed and archived on Duke Chapel's YouTube page.

Today's service of Choral Evensong begins with Boris Ord's much-loved setting of *Adam Lay Ybounden*, composed in 1955. Though this carol is his only published composition, Ord's leadership of the choir at King's College Cambridge, from 1927 until 1957, strongly shaped the traditional Nine Lessons and Carols service.

The canticles sung this evening, Howells' Collegium Regale, were composed in 1945 and are dedicated to King's College. Collegium Regale includes settings of the canticles for morning prayer, the Te Deum and Jubilate, as well the service for Holy Communion. Together, these settings represent the considerable range of Howells' compositional style, and are among his best-known works. During his time at the Royal Conservatory of Music, London, Howells studied counterpoint with Charles Wood, whose setting of O Thou the Central Orb is sung today as the anthem. The anthem text by Henry Ramsden Bramley speaks of light and radiance, looking forward to new light and life in Christ.

The service concludes with another carol setting, John Joubert's *There is no rose.* Joubert composed extensively, working in a wide variety of genres and forms; in addition to choral music, his publications include operas, orchestral works, and chamber music. *There is no rose* has been featured in King's College's Nine Lessons and Carols.

- Christmas Eve Lessons and Carols: Sunday, December 24, at 11:00 p.m.
- Epiphany Lessons and Carols: Sunday, January 7, at 4:00 p.m.

Bach Cantata on Fourth Sunday of Advent | In our Sunday morning service on December 24, at 11:00 a.m., the Duke Chapel Schola Cantorum and Mallarmé Music will perform J. S. Bach's cantata *Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland* ("Savior of the Nations, Come"), BWV 61. Dr. Richard Lischer, James T. and Alice Mead Cleland Professor Emeritus of Preaching at Duke Divinity School, will offer a homily on the cantata text and the scripture lessons for the day.

Christmas Eve at Duke Chapel | The Chapel will hold four Christmas Eve services on Sunday, December 24. These services often fill up, so attendees are encouraged to arrive early. Free parking is available in the Bryan Center Parking Garage located at 125 Science Drive.

- 2:00 p.m., Children's service with Christmas carols, a pageant, and scripture readings that tell the story of the birth of Jesus; the service lasts about thirty-five minutes.
- 5:00 p.m., The Durham Children's Choir sings and Powery preaches the sermon; the Amalgam Brass ensemble and Chapel organists lead the congregation in singing Christmas carols.
- 8:00 p.m., A service with Holy Communion and Powery preaching; the Bell Durham handbell choir plays; the Amalgam Brass ensemble and Chapel organists lead the congregation in singing Christmas carols.
- 11:00 p.m., The traditional Service of Nine Lessons and Carols by candlelight with scripture readings and Christmas carols; the singers of the Duke Chapel Schola Cantorum, a harpist, and Chapel organists lead the music, which will include the debut of an original, award-winning carol by Dr. Zebulon Highben, the Chapel's music director.
