The service today is shared as a part of the 2nd annual North Carolina HIP Early Music Festival. All of the anthems and special music are drawn from Polish composers during the Renaissance period. The hymns represent hymn melodies common to the region surrounding Poland. The processional hymn uses a 17th century folk tune from the Silesian region of the Czech Republic, near the border of Poland, though it was not harmonized until the 19th century. The recessional hymn is taken from the Genevan Psalter, which was widely known throughout Europe and even translated into a Czechlanguage edition near the end of the 16th century.
