The Old Testament lesson from 1 Kings shares the story of God providing for Elijah. When Elijah had reached the end of his strength and was ready for death, the Lord sent an angel to show Elijah God's provision for him. In the letter to the Ephesians, Paul seeks to equip Jesus' disciples with the virtues that will guide them to be a community of unity and love. In the gospel lesson, Jesus says, "I am the bread of life," the first of seven "I am" sayings in John's gospel. As the bread, Jesus reveals that he is the one who nourishes us and that we are to rely on him for eternal life.
