We warmly welcome those of you who are new to Duke and invite you to make the Chapel an integral part of your time here, as together we build community, share friendship, and encounter the living Lord Jesus. Today's scripture readings tell of the God who has come to dwell alongside us, often in the most unlikely of ways. Solomon builds the Temple to be the place where God's glory lives on earth, drawing those from far away to worship. Paul writes to the Ephesian church to equip them for a radical life of prayer amidst the unexpected challenges of life, and in the Gospel Jesus draws us to himself, as the source of all life and joy.

*At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.*
