The risen Lord Jesus has triumphed over the powers of sin, evil, and death. In today's Gospel reading we see Jesus' complete authority over evil spirits as with one command he restores a boy to full health. Jesus explains to his disciples that it is only through prayer that miracles can be accomplished in his name. The power of words is also highlighted by James, who cautions us against disunity and urges us to guard our tongues. The effect of arguing amongst individuals and the church body is likened to a blazing forest fire. Proverbs meanwhile personifies the Wisdom of the Holy Spirit, calling us to pray for divine guidance before we speak or act.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

During the prelude the congregation is asked to remain prayerfully or meditatively silent. The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please utilize the nursery in the Box Office on the second floor of Page.

Durham Nativity provides a tuition-free, enriched learning environment and an eleven-year support system for at-risk middle school boys who have the ability and commitment to achieve, but lack the resources for a quality, independent school education. The school promotes a rigorous academic program and nurtures the whole child to reach his potential through knowledge, moral values, learning skills, discipline, and character development. It also instills service for others as it builds tomorrow's role models and community leaders.

TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER—The Rev. Dr. Anna Carter Florence is the Peter Marshall Associate Professor of Preaching at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. She is an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and holds degrees from Yale College and Princeton Theological Seminary (M.Div. and Ph.D.). Before joining the Columbia faculty in 1998, Anna served as an associate pastor for youth and young adults at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis. Her books include *Preaching as Testimony* and *Inscribing the Word*, as well as two forthcoming books: *'A' is for Alabaster: A Preacher's Alphabet*, and *Come Back When You've Found Something True: New Ways to Read Scripture*, based on her 2012 Lyman Beecher Lectures on Preaching at Yale Divinity School. She is a frequent teacher and lecturer in this country and abroad. Anna and her husband, the Rev. David Carter Florence, have two grown sons.
