Today's Scripture readings speak of the pain of barrenness, and the hope of new creation. Hannah is taunted for her childlessness, and her bitter weeping before the Lord is misunderstood by the men around her, but understood by God. In compassion, the Lord grants Hannah the desire of her heart, as she conceives a son who will become the mighty prophet Samuel. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus points towards the end times, describing the birth pangs of a world yearning to be free from sin, evil, and death. We are warned not to be led astray by false teachers, but to cling to Jesus as we long for redemption and healing. In Hebrews, the authority of Jesus alone to forgive sins is explained. At the end of time Jesus' resurrection victory will be complete, as those who love him are gathered into the joy of new creation as forgiven, healed, and restored children of God.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

During the prelude the congregation is asked to remain prayerfully or meditatively silent. The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please utilize the nursery in the Box Office on the second floor of Page.




ADVENT STUDIES—Two Advent studies are being sponsored by the Congregation and are open to all who wish to participate.







