

In today's Gospel reading we see a twelve year old Jesus become separated from his earthly parents, Mary and Joseph. When asked where he was, Jesus replies that he was in his Father's house—astonishing those who heard him asking questions of the teachers in the Temple at Jerusalem. We are given insight into how Jesus grew up, fully God and fully human, as he increased in wisdom and in years. This has parallels to the story of the prophet Samuel, who was dedicated to God by his parents, and who ministered to the Lord from a very young age. In Colossians, Paul teaches the church how to live in love, doing everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God our Father through him. At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

During the prelude the congregation is asked to remain prayerfully or meditatively silent. The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please utilize the nursery in the Box Office on the second floor of Page.
