In today's Scripture readings, we see the Apostle Peter reporting to the church in Jerusalem his extraordinary vision from the Lord and the command to lay down distinctions between Jews and Gentiles. Through this Peter points to the reconciling love of Christ and shows how Christians can disagree lovingly. In John's Gospel, Jesus says that those who follow him must be known for their love for one another. This love is unafraid to follow wherever the Lord goes and is a love that encompasses all of creation—to the praise and glory of God.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.





This morning we give thanks for the Duke University Libraries.
