### ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

We welcome Dr. Ellen Davis, Amos Ragan Kearns Distinguished Professor of Bible and Practical Theology, as our guest preacher today. Dr. Davis has been at Duke Divinity School since 2001. She is a lay Episcopalian and has studied at the University of California at Berkeley (A.B.), the Church Divinity School of the Pacific and Oxford University (M.Div.), and Yale University (Ph.D.). Dr. Davis previously taught at Union Theological Seminary in New York, Yale Divinity School, and Virginia Theological Seminary. Her most recent book, *Scripture, Culture, and Agriculture: An Agrarian Reading of the Bible* (Cambridge University Press, 2009), integrates biblical studies with a critique of industrial agriculture and food production. Other publications include *Getting Involved with God: Rediscovering the Old Testament* (Cowley, 2001), *The Art of Reading Scripture*, a volume of essays co-edited with Dr. Richard Hays (Eerdmans, 2003), and *Wondrous Depth: Old Testament Preaching* (Westminster John Knox, 2005).

### New Dean of Duke Chapel

President Richard Brodhead recently announced that the Rev. Dr. Luke Powery will be the Chapel's next dean beginning September 1. Powery, who will be the first black dean of Duke Chapel, was most recently at Princeton Theological Seminary, where he was the Perry and Georgia Engle assistant professor of homiletics. Powery received his B.A. from Stanford University, his M.Div. from Princeton Theological Seminary, and his Th.D. from Emmanuel College, University of Toronto. Powery was ordained by the Progressive National Baptist Convention and has served in an ecumenical capacity in religious settings around the world. Dean Powery is married to Gail Powery, with whom he has a daughter, Moriah, and a son, Zachary. He will preach his first sermon as Dean on Sunday, September 9, and he will be leading worship on September 2 with Barbara Brown Taylor as our guest preacher. Dr. Powery's formal installation service will be during worship on October 7.

### QUESTIONS PEOPLE OFTEN ASK

### WHY DO WE READ THE GOSPEL FROM THE CENTER AISLE?

The gospel has a special status because in it are recorded the very words of Jesus himself. Placing its reading at the center of our worship reflects this authority—it embodies our conviction that the gospel stands at the very center of the Chapel's faith and life. The congregation turns to face the gospel reader, as an embodiment of the repentance Christ asks of us.

## What is the significance of the word "catholic" in the Apostles' Creed?

The Apostles' Creed was written in the third or fourth century, long before the sixteenth-century split between Protestants and Catholics. When we say we believe in the "one, holy, catholic and apostolic church," the term "catholic" (with a small "c") means "universal." We at Duke Chapel claim—and pray—to be one body with all Christians, everywhere. When "Catholic" is used with a big "C," it refers more narrowly to the Roman Catholic Church, which uses the term "Catholic" in its name because it sees itself as universal. Protestant and Orthodox Christians see the Roman Catholics as but one part, with themselves, of the wider catholic church.

It has become a tradition that this music is sung by all the participants of Tanglewood each year during the opening exercises. It is in this spirit of new beginnings that we offer this anthem today.
