

This morning's Scripture readings speak to us of the power and necessity of belonging to Christ. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus calls for repentance and proclaims the coming Kingdom of God. He calls his first disciples—Peter, Andrew, James, and John—who leave everything behind to follow him. In his letter to the church at Corinth, the apostle Paul exhorts his readers to reject divisions in the body of Christ. He invites the church both then and now to identify only with Jesus, whose cross is the source of true power.

The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement. On this Communion Sunday, families with children are invited to sit up front, so they can better observe The Great Thanksgiving.

Duke Habitat is one of the largest and most active student organizations on campus. Families selected by Habitat work closely with volunteers, investing 240–300 hours of their own labor, or "sweat equity," in building their homes. Because partner families and Duke students do nearly 80% of the work on Habitat homes, a Duke Chapter house fosters close connections between the students of Duke University and the people of Durham.

It showcases 21 works by Arab, Persian, and Jewish contemporary artists from countries of Muslim, Christian, and Jewish backgrounds. Its theme is what "bridges" people to one another, as well as what the three faiths of the artists hold in common across their different creeds and cultures.
