


Service of Tenebrae

Tenebrae (Latin for "shadows" or "darkness") is a solemn observance of Jesus' passion and death. Tenebrae services generally occur between Wednesday and Friday of Holy Week. The service marks Jesus' journey to Golgotha and allows for extended meditation through proclamation of the word in scripture and sermon, as well as through music, increasing darkness, and silent reflection. At Duke Chapel we gather on the evening of Good Friday to enter into the dramatic narrative of Jesus' betrayal, arrest, and crucifixion, and to reflect on God's sacrificial love.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

(Silence will be observed while the bell tolls 33 times to signify each year of Jesus' life.)

SILENCE

The end of the service is signified by the illumination of the draped cross. Please remain seated in silence until the side aisles are lighted to facilitate leaving. Silence is observed throughout the sanctuary from this time forward. Each person is encouraged to pray and meditate as long as he or she desires, then to depart in silence. If you would like to receive anointing with oil and prayers for healing, ministers will be in the Memorial Chapel after the worship service.
