In today's Gospel passage, Jesus the Good Shepherd offers abundant life and eternal salvation to all those who believe in him. Those who love Jesus are his sheep who know his voice. Jesus is the living fulfillment of David's Divine Shepherd in Psalm 23—the Lord who guards and protects us. In Acts, the early church celebrates the resurrection life of Jesus by living and worshiping together and by holding everything in common with one another.

Colón-Emeric is an ordained elder in the North Carolina Conference; he was founding pastor of Cristo Vive UMC and continues to serve in Hispanic Ministries in Methodist churches in North Carolina.
