LEARNING THE LITURGY OF THE CHAPEL

Chapel Tours—For a tour of Duke Chapel, meet today's docent near the front steps of the Chapel following the service.



The second one will will serve as the closing service for the Royal School of Church Music Carolina Course for Girls and Adults.
