


Service of Worship

In this morning's Old Testament passage, Jeremiah rebukes the false prophet Hananiah, who has contradicted the Lord's word. Jeremiah challenges this false prophecy of peace, saying that peace will only come in the Lord's time, when God's people obey God's word. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus encourages us to welcome him by welcoming our brothers and sisters in Christ. In the letter to the Romans, Paul teaches that the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

The congregation is invited to reflect silently during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation. The Chapel welcomes families with children. If at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.
