

This morning we celebrate Reformation Sunday and remember the faithful men and women who have lived and proclaimed the Gospel throughout the ages. The apostle Paul teaches that all who by grace receive faith in Jesus Christ will be saved through his atoning sacrifice on the cross. Once we have received faith in him, Jesus urges us to live out that faith by teaching: "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

The congregation is invited to reflect silently during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation. The Chapel welcomes families with children. If at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.
