Solomon's Prayer of Dedication for the Temple, Quatrefoil, Cathédrale d'Amiens, c. 1230

In this morning's first reading from Deuteronomy, Moses gives Israel detailed instructions on how they are to honor the Lord on Mount Ebal after they have crossed the Jordan and entered the promised land. Israel is to inscribe the laws Moses has given to them onto large stones and set up an altar to offer sacrifices of thanksgiving to the Lord. These actions are to give thanks for the abundance of the new land and to confirm Israel's covenantal relationship as the chosen people of God. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus elevates the Mosaic law concerning murder to encompass the roots of anger in our own hearts. Before we come to bring our gifts to the altar of God, Jesus first commands us to root out the anger in our hearts and reconcile with our brothers and sisters.

Dr. Cave will also continue leading the Duke Vespers Ensemble and the Bach Cantata Series. **GUEST PREACHER NEXT WEEK |** Next week's guest preacher Dr. Marlene Ringgaard Lorensen is a professor of practical theology with special obligations in homiletics at the University of Copenhagen, Denmark. She has a PhD in homiletics and spent a year as a visiting scholar at Duke Divinity School in 2012-13. Dr. Lorensen's research and teaching includes the history and theology of preaching as well as field studies of refugees' encounters with Christianity and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark. Dr. Lorensen's publications include "The Complexity of Survival: Asylum Seekers, Resilience and Religion" (2018), "Listening to the Voices: Refugees as Co-authors of Practical Theology" (2018) (co-written with Gitte Buch-Hansen), and "Dialogical Preaching: Bakhtin, Otherness and Homiletics" (2014). She is co-editor of the International Journal of the Homiletics and serves as a member of the board of Societas Homiletica, an international society of scholars of preaching.

NOMINATIONS FOR SERVICE AWARD | The Chapel is now accepting nominations for its Humanitarian Service Award. The award is given each year to recognize individuals with a commitment to service and simplicity. It is inspired by the lives of two Duke professors: Dr. George R. Parkerson Jr. and the late Dr. C.
