The Widow's Mite, Jesus MAFA Community, Cameroon

In this morning's Gospel reading, Jesus issues a sharp warning to beware of those who, like the scribes of his day, enjoy the respect of titles, robes, and privilege, while devouring the poor. Their long prayers mask a faith of appearance only that will be condemned. Pointing to the authentic faith of a widow who gives out of her poverty, Jesus declares she has given more than those who have contributed large sums out of their abundance. The Widow of Zarephath provides a similarly godly example, faithfully risking the little she has to serve Elijah. The miraculous provision of meal and oil for her is a prefiguring of the inheritance given to those who love Jesus. For "Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him." Gathering

Gomes guest preacher is the Rev. Dr. M. Craig Barnes, the seventh president of Princeton Theological Seminary. He began his presidency in January 2013, and also serves as professor of pastoral ministry. Dr. Barnes earned his Master of Divinity degree from Princeton Seminary in 1981 and his Doctor of Philosophy in church history from the University of Chicago in 1992. Before becoming president of Princeton Seminary, Barnes was a chaired professor at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary while also serving as the pastor and head of staff of Shadyside Presbyterian Church. He previously served pastorates in Madison, Wisconsin, and at the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC. He is a frequent lecturer and preacher at conferences, academic gatherings, and in congregations across the country.
