



Today we honor the witness of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and our service includes a litany in memory of those who lit the path of freedom. This morning’s Scripture passage from Isaiah speaks of the intimate love God has for us, and how the Lord’s people will be vindicated. Paul writes to the Corinthian church of the continued lavish outpouring of God’s love through the gifts of the Holy Spirit. In John’s Gospel, Jesus performs his first miraculous sign—turning water into an extravagant volume of wine at a wedding feast in Cana. As we reflect on the details of this well-known story, so we will reflect anew on the life of Dr. King, to see how familiar narratives can also yield new insights into God’s good purposes for our future lives.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

During the prelude the congregation is asked to remain prayerfully or meditatively silent. The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please utilize the nursery in the Box Office on the second floor of Page.
