In Deuteronomy, the people of Israel are promised a prophet that will rise from among them and speak the words of God. Paul argues in his first letter to the church in Corinth that despite the freedom found in Christ, believers should not become a stumbling block to those with weaker faith. In Mark's gospel, Jesus heals a man who had a disturbed spirit. As people began to see the works of Jesus and the authority by which he carried them out, it amazed them. Could it be that the kingdom of God was near?

BULLETIN INSERT ADDED AFTER MARY D. B. T. SEMANS' DEATH

Mary Duke Biddle Trent Semans, the scion of the family that founded Duke University, died on Wednesday. She was 91. Although small in physical stature, she was a towering figure in progressive causes throughout her life, championing education, human rights and the arts. In the words of President Richard Brodhead, "Mary Semans occupied a unique place in the life of this university. She was our principal link to Duke's founding generation and continued her family's tradition of benevolence throughout her life. She supported every good thing at this university, and she was a powerful force for good in Durham and the Carolinas. Above all, she had a generosity toward others and belief in human possibility that made every encounter an inspiring event. Duke mourns the passing of one of its greatest friends."

We make a special commemoration for Ms. Semans during the singing of today's introit.

- Her love of the Sarah P. Duke Gardens is symbolized by a bouquet of flowers, including several from the Mary Duke Biddle Rose Garden.
- Her commitment to the arts is captured by a portrait of her in the Nasher Museum, which exists in large part because of her vision.
- Her passion for the world of music is honored by a score of the Mozart *Requiem*.
- Her commitment to training people in the arts is represented by the logo from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts in Winston-Salem.
- Her lifelong support of the Durham community is symbolized by a plaque featuring a photograph of the revitalized Durham downtown district.
- Her commitment to civil and human rights is represented by a photograph of her with John Hope Franklin at the opening of the John Hope Franklin Center.

Artist Mike Heivly's photos give an opportunity to reflect on times of fear and community response to those who represent difference. The exhibit will continue through the morning of February 7.

TODAY'S ORGAN PRELUDE AND POSTLUDE—The year 2012 marks the 300th anniversary of the death of composer Juan Cabanilles, the last major figure from the "Golden Age" of early Spanish organ music. He served as organist at the Cathedral in Valencia from 1666 until the last years of his life. Works by Cabanilles will be performed during the Prelude and Postlude today.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES—Duke Chapel will have two services (8:00 a.m. and 5:15 p.m.) on Ash Wednesday, February 22. The Rev. Katie Owen, campus minister for Westminster Presbyterian Fellowship, will offer a homily, and there will be an opportunity to receive the imposition of ashes. The 5:15 p.m. service will include the Duke Vespers Ensemble. Ash Wednesday marks the first day of the season of Lent. Lent encompasses the 40 days prior to Easter Sunday (not including the 6 Sundays, which are considered feast days and not counted as days of penance) and is traditionally a season of repentance and fasting.

ORGAN RECITAL TODAY

Today at 5:00 p.m. Chapel Organist and Associate University Organist David Arcus will perform a free recital of music from Canada on Duke Chapel's Aeolian and Flentrop organs. The recital will feature Healey Willan's mammoth *Introduction, Passacaglia & Fugue*, anonymous Magnificat versets from *Le Livre de Montréal*, and a tribute to the Canadian rock group Rush, along with compositions by Gerald Bales, François Morel, and Rachel Laurin.
