



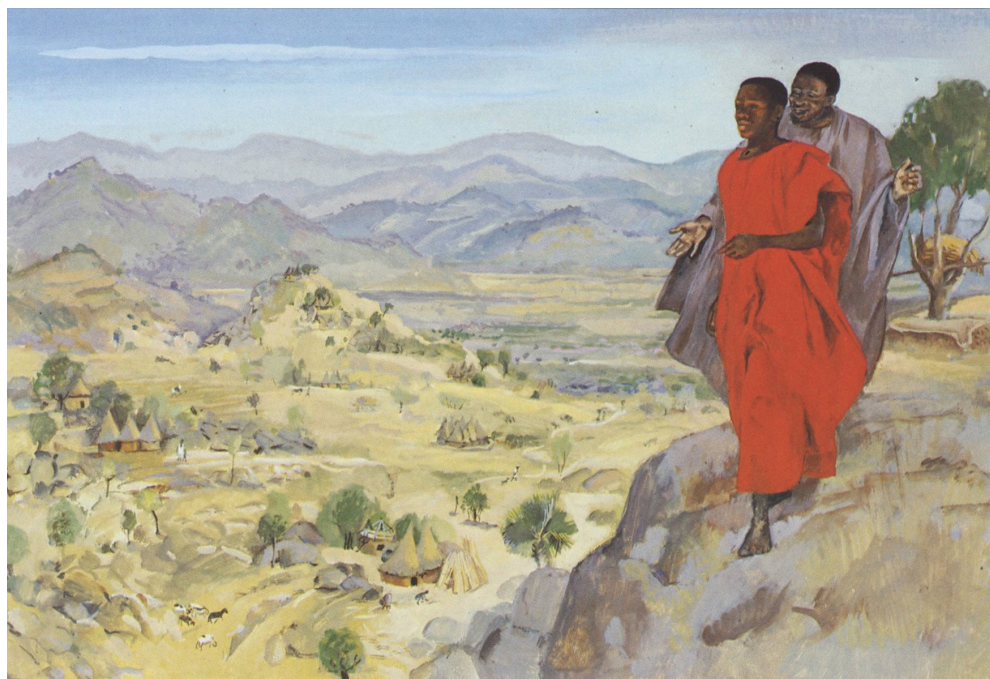

Jesus MAFA Community, *Jesus Is Tempted*

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus is confirmed in his identity as the Beloved Son of God before being led out by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness. For forty days he is without food, in the company of wild animals, and tempted by Satan. The devil fails as Jesus resists all his temptations, and God sends angels to come and minister to Jesus at the end of the period of testing. The church remembers this and walks likewise with Jesus through the season of Lent. Strengthened by his Sonship and rejection of the evil one, Jesus is now ready to begin his ministry: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."
