



Today is the first Sunday in the season of Lent, when we are invited to examine the roots of our Christian discipleship and identify with Jesus' journey to the cross. The early Sundays are a wilderness time—an opportunity to go deep into our hearts and the souls of our communities, to recognize the horror and depth of our estrangement from God, and to begin systematically to put things right. The Chapel observes the tradition of eliminating alleluias or flowers in the sanctuary during Lent: these will return with the burst of joy on Easter Day.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

The Chapel is pleased to welcome the Rev. Sarah Jobe as the Cleveus F. and Lilla Hawkins Boyles guest preacher. The Rev. Jobe is a chaplain at North Carolina Correctional Institute for Women. She is the founder of Project TURN, a partner program of Duke Divinity School that offers seminary classes inside North Carolina prisons. Sarah lives with her husband and two daughters at the Rutba House, a Christian house of hospitality in Durham. She is the author of *Creating with God: The Holy Confusing Blessedness of Pregnancy*.

CHAPEL ANNOUNCEMENTS

TODAY'S GREENERY—Throughout the season of Lent, the Chapel greenery is provided by contributors to the Nancy Hanks Fund.

TODAY'S OFFERING—All of today's cash offerings and undesignated checks will be used to support human service organizations in the greater Durham area. These nonprofit organizations are identified to receive funds by a panel of Congregation members, Friends of Duke Chapel, and students. The grant-making process not only benefits people in need but also seeks to introduce students to faithful stewardship and community development.

CHAPEL'S WEEKDAY SERVICES—Duke students are on spring break this week which means the Chapel's regular weekday services, including the Tuesday night communion service, Wednesday mid-day prayer service, and Thursday Choral Vespers will not take place this week. All services will return the week of March 16.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS—The stations of the cross hanging in Duke Chapel this Lenten season were created by Haitian artist John Silvestri using recycled materials. Silvestri made the pieces from discarded steel oil drums by scrubbing off the paint, slitting them down the side, and hammering them flat. He uses a chisel and wooden mallet to cut out the design templates, and finally textures them with an ice pick or awl. These works of art allow us to see the suffering of our Lord through the lenses of our Haitian sisters and brothers.

LABYRINTH—On Tuesday, March 18, visitors are invited to walk the Labyrinth in Duke Chapel, from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The Labyrinth, a forty-foot circle containing a winding path, is an ancient spiritual tradition in many faiths. The Labyrinth is self-guided, and takes 30 minutes to an hour to complete. The Chapel is co-sponsoring this event with the Congregation at Duke Chapel.

SPRING FELLOWSHIP EVENT—On Sunday, March 23, after church the Chapel will be offering a spring fellowship event on the Chapel lawn. Please plan to stay after the service for lemonade, cookies, and fellowship. All are welcome.
