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*“Jesus and Nicodemus,” by Caspar Luiken, 1712*

In the second Sunday of Lent, the scripture lessons emphasize faith and obedience. In Genesis, God calls Abraham from his home to be a blessing to the earth. He follows this command, even in the face of uncertainty. In John’s gospel, Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born again. In doing so, Jesus intimates that Nicodemus, though a leader among the Pharisees, does not yet understand true obedience which grows from loving trust in the living God.
