Today is the first Sunday in the season of Lent. During Lent we are invited to examine the roots of our Christian discipleship and identify with Jesus's journey to the cross. The Chapel observes Lent in our worship services by adapting our practices for the season. In addition to removing the "Alleluias" and flowers from our services, we also use a common Lenten confession, adaptations to our prayers of the people, and a Lenten affirmation of faith. May these corporate practices, along with our individual Lenten disciplines, shape our journey with Jesus to the cross.







Organ Recital Series | Dr. Robert Parkins, university organist and a professor of the practice of music at Duke, will present the third segment of a trilogy related to organ music by Johann Sebastian Bach in a recital on Sunday, March 20, at 5:00 p.m. Performed on the Chapel’s Flentrop Organ, “J. S. Bach and His Contemporaries” will feature works of Bach and contemporaneous composers from Germany, Austria, Italy, Spain, and France. Admission is free.

Stations of the Cross Exhibition | During Lent, the Chapel has on view in the main sanctuary (nave) the Stations of the Cross exhibition by artist Margaret Adams Parker. The panels of Stations of the Cross depict Christ’s Journey to the Cross with contemporary figures rendered in muted browns. Parker focuses in these paintings on Christ’s strength in the face of suffering and the intimacy of his encounters with others on his Via Dolorosa. Join Parker and Duke Divinity School Professor Ellen Davis for an artist talk about the Stations of the Cross exhibition on Tuesday, April 5, at 5:00 p.m. at the Chapel.
