The season of Lent invites us to learn to walk the way of the cross in reflecting on the depths of human sin even as we turn to our Holy God in praise. In Exodus, we hear God, who brought the people of Israel out of slavery, giving the Ten Commandments, or Ten Words, to God's covenant people. These words guide God's people into a whole-hearted love of God and neighbor: that is, they guide us into God's best ways of being human. In reflecting on these ways, we consider our individual and corporate failings that inhibit our relationship with God and damage our life in community. In humility, we repent and turn to Christ, so we may walk intimately with God.

GUEST PREACHER | This morning's Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson guest preacher is Dr. Ellen Davis, the Amos Ragan Kearns Professor of Bible and Practical Theology at Duke Divinity School. The author of ten books and many articles, her research interests focus on how biblical interpretation

bears on the life of faith communities and their response to urgent public issues, particularly the environmental crisis and interfaith relations. Her recent book, *Biblical Prophecy: Perspectives for Christian Theology, Discipleship and Ministry* (Westminster John Knox, 2014), explores the prophetic role and word across both Testaments of the Christian Bible. *Scripture, Culture, and Agriculture: An Agrarian Reading of the Bible* (Cambridge University Press, 2009), integrates biblical studies with a critique of industrial agriculture and food production. Her most recent book is *Preaching the Luminous Word* (Eerdmans, 2016), a collection of sermons and essays. A lay Episcopalian, she is active as a theological consultant within the Anglican Communion and since 2004 has worked with the Episcopal Church of Sudan and South Sudan to develop theological education, community health, and sustainable agriculture.
