In this morning’s Gospel passage we see Jesus’ authority to heal. A centurion understands this authority and asks Jesus to heal his slave. Jesus is moved by the man’s great faith and heals the man, demonstrating his love for Jew and Gentile, slave and free. It is also with the authority of the risen Jesus that we see Paul declaring his apostleship and his charge to proclaim the one true Gospel of Christ.

The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.

On this Communion Sunday, families with children are invited to sit up front so they can better observe The Great Thanksgiving. The importance of welcoming children is exemplified in Matthew 18:2-5, by Jesus' answer to the disciples as they wondered who was the greatest in the kingdom of heaven: 'He called a child, whom he put among them, and said, 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.'" Please help us welcome the children in our midst by letting them know you are glad to see them in worship. By doing so, you are also welcoming Jesus.
