Being a follower of Jesus is often hard. Loving our neighbor as ourselves, turning the other cheek, going the second mile, welcoming the stranger—the Gospel is not easy, so it can be natural to think we are not making it. Today's Gospel offers reassurance that the Apostles did not find the path any easier than we do. Jesus says to them, in essence, "After all this time, do you still not know me; do you still not get it?" But does he throw up his hands in despair and give up? No, quite the opposite. He reassures them that he will do anything they ask of him—he doubles down on his love. That is the nature of our Lord and Savior; he is always waiting for us to call out to him in his name, and he will be there, ready to answer.

His earlier books include Undomesticated Dissent: Democracy and the Public Virtue of Religious Noncomformity, Contesting Catholicity: Theology *for Other Baptists, A Company of Women Preachers: Baptist Prophetesses in Seventeenth-Century England*, and *Baptist Roots: A Reader in the Theology of a Christian People*. 
