The Psalmist proclaims God’s praise in the appointed Psalm for today. All creation is prompted to praise the one who called all things into being, whose name alone is exalted, and whose glory is above the heavens and the earth. The Psalmist implores every living thing to join in the glory and praise of God. John’s Gospel reveals that loving one another is the way to glorify God. Jesus says that God has been glorified in him, and Jesus calls his disciples to follow him in the way of sacrificial love. Christ’s calling extends to disciples of every generation who seek to glorify God: “Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another.” By loving one another, we reveal to all people that we are followers of Jesus.

University Prayer of Thanksgiving | Each week, we focus on a different campus unit, school, or department for whom to give thanks to God for their service and contributions to the wider university and beyond. Final Day of 'Communion of Saints' Exhibition | Today is the final day for the exhibition now on display in the Chapel, *Communion of Saints: A Reflection on the Body of Christ through Time and Space*. The exhibition presents woodblock prints of past saints and important figures of the church alongside images of current students, faculty and staff at Duke. *Communion of Saints* was created by Rebekah Schultz, a Duke Divinity School student who was selected as this year's Duke University Chapel C. Eric Lincoln Fellow. The annual fellowship for students provides funding to an undergraduate or graduate student to complete a sacred art project and is named in honor of C. Eric Lincoln who was a professor of Religion and Culture at Duke University from 1976–1993.

Saturday Service Project | Meals on Wheels of Durham has received a grant to deliver produce to their clients. This is a real gift to homebound seniors who often cannot get to the store to pick out produce or afford the cost of fresh fruits and vegetables. Volunteers are needed this Saturday, May 21, from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. to work at Meals on Wheels of Durham located at 2522 Ross Road, Durham. Volunteers will help sort the produce boxes and load them on to carts and open large bags of dry pet food and put it into smaller bags for delivery during the week.
