


Service of Worship

The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob is also the God of Hagar and Ishmael. In Genesis, when Abraham is worried he will not produce an heir, he fathers a child, Ishmael, through the slave-girl Hagar. Today's lesson describes how Sarah's jealousy eventually forces Abraham to cast Hagar and Ishmael from their home. But God assures Abraham that he will hear their cry and provide for them. The place of their grief becomes a place of new life and new promise. Matthew reminds us that God sees the sparrow when it falls and knows the number of hairs on each person's head. The God of all creation draws near to us and knows us intimately.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel, located to the left of the chancel.

Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a Service of Healing will be held in the Memorial Chapel. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we are pleased to welcome the Rev. Dr. Eboni Marshall Turman as the Chapel's guest preacher. Dr. Turman is Assistant Research Professor of Black Church Studies and Director of the Office of Black Church Studies at Duke Divinity School. She has taught theology and ethics at Union Theological Seminary in New York City and Hood Theological Seminary in Salisbury, NC. She is the author of *Toward a Womanist Ethic of Incarnation: Black Bodies, the Black Church, and the Council of Chalcedon* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2013), as well as a number of essays and articles. Dr. Turman is the youngest woman to be licensed and ordained by the historic Abyssinian Baptist Church in the City of New York, and the second woman to preside over the ordinances in Abyssinian's 206-year history. Dr. Turman is currently working on her second book on gender and African American churches.
