What does it mean to follow God? In today's scripture passage from Genesis 22, Abraham takes his son Isaac to be sacrificed. It is one of the most challenging passages in scripture. Is Abraham's action blind obedience, or faithful trust? In Matthew's gospel, the disciples are given encouragement for their journey, in light of the difficult knowledge that many times their words of good news and their attempts to follow God would not be welcomed or received.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel, located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a Service of Healing will be held in the Memorial Chapel. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation. The Chapel welcomes families with children. If at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.

CHAPEL ANNOUNCEMENTS

TODAY'S FLOWERS—Flowers for today's worship service are given to the glory of God by the Nan and Taylor Cole Chapel Endowment.

TODAY'S OFFERING—All of today's cash offerings and undesignated checks will be used to underwrite the costs for undergraduate students going on the Chapel's Spring Break mission trips. Duke Chapel PathWays provides mission trip opportunities for students who are interested in spending their Spring Break in service and reflection. Most recently, Chapel staff led student trips to Costa Rica and South Carolina.

TODAY'S GUEST CHOIR—The Chattanooga Boys Choir was founded in 1954 and is the oldest boychoir in the southeastern United States. The organization now includes over 120 boys from ages 8-18 in five different ensembles from across the Chattanooga area and northwest Georgia. Members represent over forty different public, private, and parochial schools and many home school students. They participate in a thorough music performance and education program including vocal musicianship, ensemble skills, and tutelage in music theory through the CBC Computer Music Theory Lab. The choir is a frequent guest at university music education methods courses, music teacher workshops, and church music conferences. The choir has performed across the United States and in twenty foreign countries including recent performance tours of the Czech Republic, Ireland, and Canada. In 2013, the choir traveled to Cuba as invited guests of the Cuban Ministry of Culture. The choir made its Carnegie Hall debut in 2005 and appeared at the renowned Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, SC in 2006 and 2012. The CBC has also appeared in several commercially released recordings, including the Grammy-nominated NAXOS recording of Ravel's *L'enfant et les Sortilèges* with the Nashville Symphony Orchestra (2009).

GOODBYE TO ROB HORTON—Today marks the final Sunday for interim organist, Dr. Robert Horton. The Chapel has been grateful for his excellent leadership during his time in Durham. In the short time that Rob has been here, he has been productive, innovative, and professional, using his many skills to enhance the music and worship of Duke Chapel. His contributions are deeply appreciated, and we wish him all the best.
