Forty days after Easter, the Church celebrates the Ascension of Jesus as described in Acts, Luke, and Mark. Today we mark this celebration. In many traditions, the Feast of the Ascension is one of the holiest and most celebrated moments in the liturgical year; it is also among the most ancient of Christian traditions. The Church holds that the day of Ascension is a day for celebration because all the work that Jesus came to do has been accomplished, and he returns to the right hand of God the Father. In the lesson from Luke, Jesus blesses the disciples as he ascends into heaven, prompting their worship and joy.

SUMMER SCRIPTURE LESSONS | As Christians who worship in a liturgical tradition, we follow the Revised Common Lectionary for our scripture texts throughout the year. This three-year cycle of scriptures follows the Christian calendar, and passages are selected to match the season of the Church year and the themes present therein. This summer during Ordinary Time, we will be following a different selection of texts. Together, we will read the book of Ezekiel as our primary scripture lessons in our Sunday services, and we will invite you to read Ezekiel with us outside of our Sunday services. Reading through the book together will allow our community to learn from scripture passages that we do not regularly encounter through the lectionary in our worship services and will open us to receive from a broader range of the scriptural canon; this approach is called *lectio continua*. We hope you will join us through the summer as we read, study, and learn from the book of Ezekiel. For June 16, please read Ezekiel 1:1-3:27.

ACCESS TO THE CHAPEL THIS SUMMER | This summer Duke Chapel continues to be open daily with worship services on Sunday morning, as well as other events; however, a number of construction and maintenance projects will limit access to the Chapel. During the week, the front doors of the Chapel will be closed and visitors should enter the nave through the south transept (closest to the Bryan Center) or via the handicap ramp on the north side (closest to the Divinity School). The front doors will be open on the weekends. Also, the roadway that loops in front of the Chapel will be closed to vehicle and pedestrian traffic.
