Today's scripture readings center on the provision of God for those in need. The reading from 1 Kings depicts God providing for the prophet Elijah as he is fleeing for his life. Paul's letter to the Galatians describes the provision of righteousness by faith in Christ rather than through the keeping of the law. This provision promises that all those in Christ are counted among Abraham's offspring, the people of God. The Gospel reading tells the story of Jesus casting out demons from a man, to which the man responds by testifying to God's provision in his moment of need.


