This morning's Scripture passages speak of the extraordinary intimacy we are invited into with God through prayer. Abraham relied on his friendship with God to bargain with the Lord in astonishing fashion. In his letter to the Colossians, Paul urges us to reject false teaching and instead turn to Jesus, in whom the fullness of deity dwells bodily. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus himself teaches us to pray to our Father, trusting for our daily provision. Whereas we humans often respond to calls for help grudgingly, in contrast we can trust in the constant goodness and love of the Father, who delights in us as children.

*At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.*

*The congregation is invited to reflect silently during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation. The Chapel welcomes families with children. If at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.*

## CHANGES TO PARKING AT DUKE CHAPEL

The Bryan Center Parking Garage (PGIV) has begun a new parking system. Sunday morning parking will continue to be free until 1:30 p.m. but will require each driver to take a ticket upon entry to the garage and to authenticate it at a pay station available on each pedestrian-entry floor (levels 2 and 3) prior to exiting the garage.

Please plan to arrive early on upcoming Sundays as our community becomes acquainted with the new system. For those who worship regularly at the Chapel, free QR code cards will be available to allow Sunday morning entry and exit. Cards are available at the attendant's desk in the nave near the main entrance of the Chapel.

If you plan to stay past 1:30 p.m. and do not have a Duke parking permit, then please park on levels 4 and 5. Your ticket upon arrival/QR code card will ensure free parking up until 1:30 p.m. You will then have to pay the difference after that time at the pay station on level 3 before you exit.
