

What we value as a society can be very different from what Jesus calls us to value. In today’s Gospel reading, Jesus warns against placing our security in possessions, and ignoring the will of God. Likewise, Paul teaches the church at Colossae that for those who believe in Christ, their life is now hidden in him. Therefore we are to put to death our sin and be renewed in the likeness of Christ. The prophet Hosea records God’s urging of Israel to embrace a life worthy of the Lord, and not to test the God whose justice and love are perfect.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is invited to reflect silently during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation. The Chapel welcomes families with children. If at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please know there is a nursery in the Chapel basement.

They were formerly co-pastors of the Lamb's Church in New York City, and often preach concurrently in English and Spanish. Salguero is the founder of the National Latino Evangelical Coalition (NaLEC) which offers an important leadership voice for the close to 8 million Latino evangelicals in the United States. He earned a MDiv from New Brunswick Theological Seminary and completed a PhD in Christian Social Ethics at Union Theological Seminary in New York. Salguero also received a Doctor in Divinity (*honoris causa*) from Eastern Nazarene College in Massachusetts.
